Message from the Mayor

An Ounce of Prevention

Perfect or absolute security should be the goal of every member of the Bay Harbor Islands community. However, in reality, a state of absolute security is impossible to attain. There is no object so well protected that it cannot be stolen, damaged or destroyed. With the summer already upon us, we are apt to be less attentive to our vulnerability due in part to the heat and sun during the day and the mugginess at night that we are experiencing these days on our Islands.

Although we don't have a problem of epidemic proportions in our community "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Realistically we can't expect our police and judicial system to solve the problem alone. We can help to make it difficult for criminals to victimize us. By working with out law enforcement as a team we can make a difference. Listed below are some previously tested ways you can make it difficult for criminals to have the advantage:



- Update locks; use cylinder locks with deadbolt feature. Secure your homes.
- Don't leave an extra key in the mailbox, under the doormat, etc.
- Remember that the best lock in the world is worthless if you carelessly leave your door unlocked or open your door without knowing who is there. Be wary of solicitors, etc. They should have proper credentials.
- Don't attract burglars by leaving tools, furniture and toys in the yard overnight. Don't leave notes indicating when you will return.
- Going on vacation? Cancel deliveries, notify the police that you will be away, double check all doors and windows, have a neighbor check your home occasionally.
- Be prepared. You can minimize your loss to a burglar if you plan ahead. Store your valuables in a safe deposit box. Keep serial numbers and mark your property.
- Start a "Buddy System" with your neighbors to check each others' homes. Report any suspicious actions, sounds or strangers to the police.
- Stay off the dark streets; walk with a companion when possible.
- Warn your children, in terms they can understand, about child molesters and other sex offenders.
- Know where your children are who they are with and what they are doing.
- Call the police if you see or suspect a crime. Don't investigate it yourself.
- Lock your car when you leave it; use your trunk to store valuables; keep your vehicle registration to show "legal" possession of your car.
- Don't pick up hitchhikers. Harmless looking youngsters could be criminal psychopaths.
- Support the groups working with young people to foster a sense of neighborhood loyalty and build character.
- Obey the law yourself, "all the laws," all the time. Set an example for your children.
- Secure your boating equipment and mark it with your identification code.

Take it from an old time cop, don't put off these simple steps to reduce your vulnerability. Our police are knowledgeable and willing to help you make your individual crime prevention work. Call and ask them for advice. As the saying goes, they are here to "serve and protect" and they do just that in Bay Harbor Islands. However, we could do a lot better if everyone joins in our community crime prevention program.

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Garbage and Recycling Reminders

Garbage & Trash

- Household garbage should be bagged and placed inside your 95-gallon container. Containers should not be over-filled and lids should be kept closed.
- Ordinary trash and yard clippings are also to be placed in containers. **Do not place these items curbside.** You may be assessed a fee for violating the Town's ordinances. Lawn maintenance companies are required to remove all yard debris.
- Special pick-ups of bulk trash such as furniture or large boxes are only done on Thursday. Place these items curbside on Wednesday. You must call Town Hall to schedule the pick up of large home appliances such as refrigerators. **The Town will not pick-up construction debris.**

Recycling

- All recycling materials should be placed together in the recycling bin.
- Items that should be recycled are: newspaper, folded cardboard, aluminum and tin cans, glass bottles, juice and milk cartons and plastic containers with 1, 2 & 3 on the bottom.
- Items that **should not** be placed in the recycling bin are bubble wrap, packaging materials, pizza boxes, shoe boxes, plastic bags, lids, caps, straws, foil, chemicals, wire hangers, aerosol cans, ceramics, light bulbs or window glass.
- Phone books will be picked up from August-November only. **Bring household batteries to Town Hall for recycling. For disposal of paint and other chemicals, call (305) 594-1500.**

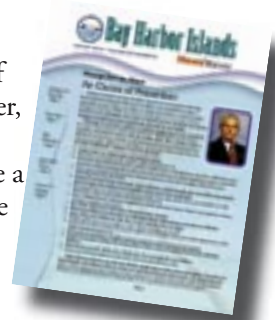

Highlights of the July 12 Council Meeting

- Approved on second reading Ordinance #901 amending Chapter 5 of the Town Code related to Buildings and Construction; Section 5-19.1 window tints and Section 5-19.1.1 setting specific provisions for windows and door openings.
- Approved on second reading Ordinance #902 amending Chapter 16, Retirement System, with requested changes from Sugarman & Suskin, to comply with requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States.
- Approved on second reading Ordinance #903 amending Article II of Chapter 19, Traffic, Parking and creating Article III, Broad Causeway.
- Approved a request from Assistant Town Manager Jimenez for authorization to enter into a grant agreement with the Florida Energy and Climate Commission in the amount of \$33,000 for replacement of all lighting fixtures at the Town Hall Buildings to reduce future energy costs for the Town.
